

## DESCRIPTIVE ADJECTIVES FOR PEOPLE

You have brown eyes.

He has curly hair.

She is outgoing.

I feel sad.

- Descriptive adjectives go *before* the word (noun) they describe.
- In sentences with verbs like *be*, *feel*, *become*, etc. (also called *linking verbs*), the adjective describing the subject goes *after* the verb.

### COMPARISONS WITH *LESS* / *LEAST*

Irregular adjective	Comparative form	Superlative form
little	less	least

Comparative <i>less...than</i>	Example
Subject + verb + <i>less</i> + adjective + <i>than</i> + noun.	The movie is <b>less</b> interesting <b>than</b> the book.
Superlative <i>least</i>	Example
Subject + verb + the + <i>least</i> + adjective + noun + complement.	This is the <b>least</b> expensive sweater in the store.

- Irregular adjectives are adjectives that do not form their comparatives and superlatives by adding *-er* / *-est* or *more* / *most*.
- The superlative *least* is used to describe a noun which is at the lower limit of a quality.
- We use *the least* to make the superlative form of longer adjectives and the majority of adverbs.
